





### What is "cohousing"?

In August 2017, INDY Week published the article How the Triangle Became Ground Zero in the Cohousing Movement. I'll come back to that in a moment. Cohousing is a type of cooperative living that includes: members owning their own homes; shared commons spaces; emphasis on engagement, participation and community. Most cohousing communities are semi-urban to rural, with freestanding homes or townhouses, and shared community house, gardens, and laundry facilities. Some are urban and built as condominiums. They are not communes. Each is unique and makes their own rules. And it is not for everyone!

Back when the INDY article was written, there were about six cohousing groups in the Triangle, which put the Triangle near the top of per capita cohousers per urban areas in the US. Now there are at least two more. I'd expect there'd be more such communities, except they are difficult to form due to logistical hurdles and need for significant initial capital — requiring either a developer or individuals who already have accumulated assets enough to fund the project.

One of the oldest examples of cohousing in the Triangle is Solterra on Erwin Road between Durham and Chapel Hill, a spread-out community of 37 families with a two-acre garden. More recently constructed is Village Hearth Cohousing near N. Roxboro Street and Infinity Road, geared toward 55+ and LGBT-focused. At the north end of downtown is Durham Central Park Cohousing (DCPC), a five-story condominium on Hunt Street including 24 living units with ample commons space and two guest rooms.

I've lived in Durham for about 30 years, and Northgate Park has been my home for almost 26. But, I've also been interested in cohousing for most of that time. I'm now a member of Bull City Commons Cohousing, which will break ground soon on Trent Drive in Old West Durham. It will be a five-story condominium similar to DCPC mentioned above.
