SPRING = REMOVE CANKERWORM BANDS, ADOPT & WATER NEW BABY TREES

SPRING = REMINDER: Don't forget to remove any cankerworm bands on trees! Durham's urban forester & our agricultural extension remind that mid/late May is the latest time to keep them up – it can hurt the tree's bark & vital upper layers if left on longer. Also, don't forget to give at least a gallon of water to any street/park/yard tree under 3 years old (and *please* adopt/water any of our 60+ February-arrival fleet of new sapling babies!) if there's been less than an inch of rain for 7 days these hot months.



Our new babies especially need help while growing their roots, to not die this season. Thank you all community planters and water-sherpas to help rebuild the tree canopy we're losing with our elder oaks. You rock!

AN INTERVIEW WITH KIM SNYDER, OUR NORTHGATE HOME-BAKER ENTREPRENEUR!

Our intrepid interviewer 'sat down' – virtually! - for a fun chat with this local businesswoman & chef extraordinaire, from her cozy kitchen on Leon street.

How did you become a baker - how long have you been baking?

"I never grew up wanting to be a baker - I fell into it purely by accident! My true passion is cooking & party planning. 8 years ago, I brought a pumpkin cheesecake to my Duke tailgate party -- and received 4 orders for Thanksgiving! I then brought a piece of the cake to Bennett Pointe Grill (where I was/still am a server) - after sampling, they asked me to be their in-house dessert baker!"

What was it like setting up to become an at-home entrepreneur?

"After those first orders, I had no idea what to charge or how to package them. I was just shocked that people wanted to buy my creations! I'd never made a layer cake from scratch...had no family recipes for reference...so Google and I became fast friends. So much trial and error. So many errors. (Lol)!

Once I got better/more confident, I started doing private orders & created a very simple website – www.kakingbykim.com. This led to more research, equipment & space requirements. Also a high level of organizational skills, which thankfully I inherited from my mother (along with a great palate and an open-minded, adventurous approach to food)."

Things were quite extraordinary this past year. How did the pandemic affect your work/business?

"I really had to pivot to stay afloat. I advertised on neighborhood list serves vs. relying on word of mouth. Online supply ordering was a nightmare, so I had to be very creative with dry good and perishable acquisitions...and I learned to make small cakes and cheesecakes to accommodate more limited gatherings. This meant still more equipment! - and adjusting my recipes...there were quite a few "fingers crossed" moments.





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I also started doing gluten free, dairy free, sugar free and even vegan baking. I left my comfort zone! And I added PayPal, Venmo and Zelle as payment options.

Thankfully, I've also been back working at/for the restaurant for a while now -- so don't have to solely rely on baking for my income as I did then."

What safety guidelines did you set up for/during the pandemic?

I wore/wear a mask and gloves while baking, and did/do contactless pick-ups for clients – I've even started shipping orders throughout the country - 18 states and counting!

Thanks for the window into your world of cuisine!

GARDENER'S CORNER SPRING 2021: OUT OF THE WOODS...

The warm season returns, along with the glory of flowers and winged wanderers of welcome (or less so) varieties. We'll see the 7 year cicadas in all their brief glory joining our hummingbird, butterfly & bumble/bee visitors -- and other feathered & scaly/slippery friends -- in July/August. Perhaps you've planted (or will plant) a tree or bush to observe Earth/Arbor day, or just adopt one of our 60+ new park/street tree babies to water in the dry weeks so it will survive while its roots establish.

Maybe you'll grow caterpillars inside or out, or foster and release tadpoles with a club or solo. Hummingbirds might enjoy your simple sugar-water feeder, or birds your seed, suet or dry mealworms for their babies, or make a home in your birdhouse, nearby tree or even flowerpot. Or perhaps like us, preying mantids will spend their infancy in your pimento pepper plants! Or possibly you'll just adopt and keep a storm drain to Ellerbe creek near your rental open & clean for summer storm water flashes.

Either way, nature's heading into the peak celebration of life, and you can help keep & restore the balance of the beauty in many (and easy) ways...then relax in the yard or park with a sense of peace and satisfaction at the way your choices can foster good for creatures and community.

It's a magical time....don't miss out on making a difference, even if it's only a few moments. Extra credit: help a kid or friend grow a little of that engagement and wonder in themselves. It will foster the next generation of givers and growers to join the flora and fauna. Enjoy!

<u>TOMATOES: NOT JUST FOR</u> <u>Salsa anymore</u>

You tried your hand at tomatoes this year, and... You have a bumper crop!! Now. What can you do with them other than giving them away or make salsa or the usual tomato-based foodstuffs? You can try this recipe!

[Please note, I gleaned this recipe from the wilds of the forgotten corners of the interwebs - the latest entry having been in 2006 <ahem>, so the measurements are highly uncertain. One could presume that "a part" of sugar might mean a teaspoonful - or a half-cup. Also, oven temperature is not mentioned. I would say very low and possibly use a cast-iron pan. But it's up to you. Use your imagination.]

Tomato Candy

1. Wash, blanch and peel the ripe tomatoes, cut crosswise into halves and

remove seeds. (Don't squeeze the tomatoes, just press gently).

2. Dry the tomatoes. Put 1 part sugar for every part of tomato halves, let stand overnight.

3. Boil slowly in the pan until tomatoes are semitransparent. Drip off the syrup.

 Spread the pieces on a single layer in trays. Sun dry or put in oven until semi-dried.

5. Roll in fine granulated sugar. Dry further, wrap in cellophane, then pack in plastic bags.
